50 YEARS OF ESTABLISHMENT OF DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS BETWEEN INDIA AND BANGLADESH

of establishment of diplomatic relations between India and Bangladesh, the two countries celebrated Maitri Diwas or Friendship Day at the India Pavilion in Expo 2020 Dubai. The celebrations signify an important milestone for India-Bangladesh partnership as it completes half-a-century and continue to strengthen, mature, and evolve as a model for bilateral relations for the entire region. As part of the historic celebrations, the Pavilion organised various performances including folk songs and dance depicting the rich cultural heritage of the two countries. Consul General of India in Dubai along with his Bangladesh counterpart also attended the event. Speaking on the occasion, Dr. Aman Puri, Consul General of India in Dubai and Deputy Commissioner-General for India at Expo 2020 Dubai said, "Over the last 50 years, the India-Bangladesh relationship has only strengthened, and socio-economic transformation of Bangladesh is an inspiration for the whole region." "Under the visionary leadership of the Prime Ministers of India and Bangladesh, the two countries are witnessing a golden era in the relationship, and we must continue to work together and make sure that this enormous goodwill is able to transform into more benefits for the people of India and Bangladesh", said Dr. Puri. "We must congratulate the UAE which is enabling the world to come together at Expo 2020 Dubai. It is a matter of pride that we are celebrating Maitri Diwas at the India Pavilion. It is an important message that governments across the globe must use this global platform to find ways and means to collaborate more for the benefit of people in their countries so that together

In his address, Mr. B M Jamal Hossain, Consul General of Bangladesh in Dubai said, "The holding of Maitri Diwas is a reflection of the deep and abiding friendship between the people of India and Bangladesh that has been forged in blood and shared sacrifices." "Over the last decades, both the countries have made remarkable progress on cooperation in large number of areas including security, connectivity, infrastructure, power, culture, people to people contact, disaster management, health etc. India has become one of the biggest development partners of Bangladesh and bilateral trade is now over USD 10 billion. Bangladesh-India relationships are now considered as a role model for neighbourhood diplomacy", he added. Earlier this year in March when Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi paid a State Visit to Bangladesh, both the countries decided to commemorate 06 December as Maitri Diwas, as it was on this day in 1971 that India recognized Bangladesh. India was one of the first countries to establish bilateral diplomatic ties with Bangladesh.





MAHARASHTRA

19 NOVEMBER - 02 DECEMBER, 2021

The Maharashtra fortnight was inaugurated by Shri Subhash Desai, Minister of Industries, Govt. of Maharashtra along with Smt Aditi Tatkare, Minister of State for Industries and Tourism and Shri Amit V. PERSONAL DATA PROTECTION LAWS IN THE UAE

Personal data generally includes all information that is unique to an individual, starting from his name and address to his physical and biometric records. Needless to say, such information is precious and must be protected, at all costs. The damage resulting from unauthorised access to personal data, is unimaginable. To counter this, countries around the world have been introducing legislations and legal frameworks to protect personal data of people. In 2021, in its 50th year as a nation, the UAE entered the fold as well, by enacting the Federal Decree-Law

No. 45 of 2021 regarding personal data protection. Herein, the provisions of the UAE's Data Protection Law are recounted, in the backdrop of the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) of the European Parliament, and what this law shall mean for business owners in the UAE.

PERSONAL DATA PROTECTION:

The advent and assimilation of the internet into people's lives today, has made it inevitable for a large volume of personal data and records to be submitted, exchanged, stored and/or processed, virtually. However, the virtual space (like physical storage spaces) is not free from sabotages and unauthorised accesses. Over the years, internet service providers/ data processing entities/ entities with access to personal data pools, have been devising various ways to accord protection to the personal data at their disposal. However, this wasn't really making the data-owner a 'party in the process'. As such he had no say into the manner in which his personal data could be stored or processed. Especially, with the social media outbreak, the concerns regarding personal data protection intensified, and support grew – in terms of enhancing the average internet user's participation in terms of protecting his own personal data. Even in cases, where data is transferred physically, it was thought essential that the data-owner must know what is to happen to his data and where

and how it must be stored. With a view to accord protection to personal data, countries around the world have introduced information privacy laws or laws to protect personal data. Of these the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) passed by the European Parliament in 2016 features prominently, as one of the most stringent of legislations on the subject. It has acted as a model law for many countries to follow suit. In 2021, UAE introduced its own Data Protection Law. The said law has come into effect from 2 January 2022.

THE RELEVANT PROVISIONS:

The relevant provisions of the Data Protection Laws are mentioned hereinafter.

- The Data Protection Law has been given an extraterritorial application, much like the GDPR provisions, and therefore, all entities (inside or outside the UAE) processing personal data of a UAE data subject are subject to the provisions of the Data Protection Law.
- Personal data cannot be processed with the consent of the data owner or the 'data subject' (the person who owns the data)
- The consent for data processing must be given specifically

- in clear and unambiguous terms whereby it must be stated that the data subject has understood what data is being submitted for processing, the purposes for which the data shall be used by the controller (at whose disposal the data shall be)
- Rights introduced: By the Data Protection Law, a data subject has the following rights:
- 1. to receive information, from controllers in control of their data:
- 2. to seek transfer of their data
- 3. to seek corrections and deletion of their data (i.e., right to be 'forgotten')

- 4. to restrict processing of personal data
- 5. to raise objections on data processing in certain cases.
- 6. to raise objections to automated processing.
- The Data Protection Law also mandates for certain entities to appoint their own 'Data Protection Officer' in certain cases. His duty shall be to be in charge of the personal data provided to his entity, to ensure protection thereof and also to address concerns of the data subjects, in simple terms.
- Processing personal data for marketing shall no longer be possible, except without

- obtaining the consent of the data subject.
- Entities must also have clear and transparent account of the purposes for which they may be obtaining personal data.
- Entities must also carry out assessments in terms of con-
- sequences and impact of usage of any technology or tools in processing/ storage of personal data and whether they would pose any risk to the personal data at their disposal.
- The Data Protection Law further has provisions regarding

the establishment of a UAE Data Office, which is likely to be the regulatory authority in respect of processing of personal data, of the UAE data subjects. The UAE Data Office is currently being set up and further details are expected to come in soon.

INDIAN ENTITIES IN THE UAE:

The Data Protection Law is in effect since 2 January 2022, and further regulations surrounding the law are expected to come in. Such regulations shall further clarify the position of controllers and as to what compliance requirements they must fulfil, in due course. Indian entities in the UAE, whose activities include processing of personal data of individuals qualifying as UAE data subjects will have the obligations of a data controller under the provisions of the Data Protection Law and following are some preliminary measures these entities may start adopting.

- The following information must be provided to the data subject at the time of obtaining his/her personal data.
- 1. Details of the data controller and the data protection officer in the entity
- 2. A description of the categories of personal data the entity processes
- 3. The purpose(s) of the processing
- 4. Information in relation to the persons authorized to access the personal information
- 5. Retention period and limits of the processing
- 6. The method of erasing or rectifying the information

- Any information related to cross border data transfers; and
- 8. Any information related to the technical and organizational measures used to secure personal information.
- Where the entity (as a data controller) needs to handover personal data in its possession to a third party for processing, the controller must also ensure that there are firmly drafted contracts in place with such third party whereby specific information about the data processing (such as the scope, purpose and the type of personal data processed), and clear demarcations of the obligations, responsibilities and the roles of the processor are made.
- Ensuring that the data subject is duly and fully informed and advised by the data controller in terms of -
- 1. the categories of personal data of the data subject that are being processed
- 2. the purpose for which the data subject's data is being processed
- 3. if the personal data is being shared within or outside the UAE
- 4. automated decision making

- on his/ her personal data
- 5. the controls or standards that have been implemented for storage of the data subject's personal data
- 6. the actions that may be taken or adopted for rectification, restriction or erasure of the data subject's personal data
- 7. the safeguards that have been applied or put in place to the data subject's personal data in case of cross border data transfer (i.e., where the personal data is to be moved out of the UAE)
- 8. actions to be taken in case of personal data breach such as accidental or unlawful destruction, loss, alteration, unauthorised disclosure of, or access to, personal data transmitted, stored or otherwise processed]
- Procedure to lodge a complaint with the UAE Data Office
- By the provisions of the Data Protection Law, where personal data of a UAE the controller must ensure that the state/ territory to which the personal data is to be transferred must offer an adequate level of protection.

CONCLUSION:

The UAE's Data Protection Law is unique inasmuch as it was drafted in consultation and participation of a myriad number of experts from various backgrounds apart from the honourable lawmakers themselves. Likewise, similar legislations from around the world, were also referred in order to bring about a legislation which is both robust and reasonable. Thus, in many ways, global common standards in data protection shall apply in the UAE, as they do elsewhere. The bottom-line however is that personal data needs protection, and the Data Protection Law is essentially a step in the right direction.

technologies that will transform the way healthcare is delivered. Globally 3 million babies die in their first month of life every year. 98% of these deaths occur in the developing world. In India alone, approximately 3.6 million premature babies are born every year and out of them,400,000 babies die. This is due to an inability to identify apnea, hypothermia and respiratory distress in premature infants in a timely manner. Almost all of these deaths can be prevented with cost-effective monitoring of vital-signs.

Nemocare has developed an easy to use, wearable device ("Raksha"), that wraps around the foot and monitors 6 main vital

And all the information is relayed onto the cloud and this data can be accessed at a central monitor by which the nurse or doctor can continuously and remotely monitor all the babies through a single interface. The device/platform can accurately notify healthcare workers so that they can intervene before it's too late. In the back-end, vital signs are analyzed by a deep learning algorithm. It promotes Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC) and Breast feeding by providing ICU grade monitoring and access at mother side ensuring faster recovery. The entire system along with our deep learning algorithm works as an intelligent platform that will track the baby's health in the most accurate way possible and give only insightful notifications and alerts to healthcare work-




ers to enable timely intervention when a distress condition is detected. With no technology risk a hospital can make any of its beds into an ICU bed quickly. The simple and easy to use design allows it to be immediately deployable in a clinical setting. The Nemocare platform will help collect, store, visualize and analyse the data generated. This can enable a paradigm shift in clinical diagnostics and preventive care through a data driven approach. Inherently the data is used in real time to provide early warning scores and other predictive indicators (eg for early identification of onset of Sepsis), and is used offline to develop new predictive algorithms. 

Every corner of the state has something brilliant to delight visitors with, whether it be man-made or natural. The forts.

palaces, museums, monuments and temples dotting the state present visitors with architectural and aesthetic delight. This is further enriched by the cultural festivals, dance forms and theatre performances that one may experience while being in the state. It is then no wonder that Kerala was selected by the National Geographic Traveller as one of the "top 50 destinations to visit in one's lifetime" and one of the "thirteen paradises in the world". Lonely Planet listed it as "one of the best 5 family vacation places" in the 2016 edition. A BBC Travel survey rated Kerala as the "top favourite tourist destination among foreign travellers", in 2018. Kerala attracted more than 11 million tourists from within India and abroad in 2019, recording a steady growth of 17.2 per cent. In 2020-21, passenger traffic handled by the state stood at 2,458,458 from Cochin airport.










